Biographical sketch: Saros Cowasjee was born July 12, 1931 in Secundrabad, Deccan, India. He is the son of Dara and Meher Cowasjee. He currently resides in Regina. He received his B.A. and M.A. from Agra University, Agra, India, in 1951 and 1955 respectively. His PhD was obtained from the University of Leeds in 1960. Cowasjee has taught English at the University of Regina since 1963. He was a Research Associate at the University of California, Berkeley in 1970-71, and was Visiting Commonwealth Professor at the University of Aarhus, Denmark, in 1975. He writes Indian/Canadian novels and short stories and serves as a critic. He has contributed to numerous publications in Canada, the U.K., and India, and has been general editor of the "Literature of the Raj" series since 1984. He is an authority on the 20th century Irish playwright Sean O'Casey, and Indian author Mulk Raj Anand. His novels include *Goodbye to Elsa* and *Suffer Little Children*.
