







Undergraduate Certificate Programs

Certificate in Administration Level I – 5 courses

This certificate is designed to fill a gap in cross-cultural teacher training

Certificate of Extended Studies in First Nations Language – 10 courses

Applicants to this program must hold a Bachelor of Education with some Cree and Saulteaux language background.

$Certificate\ in\ Indigenous\ Language\ I-5\ courses$

This program will familiarize the student with spoken and written forms of a select Indigenous language. Languages available include but are not limited to: Cree, Saulteaux (Ojibwe), Dene, Dakota and Nakota.

Certificate in Indigenous Language II – 10 courses

The program builds on the Certificate in Indigenous Language I by adding advanced studies in the chosen language, including its linguistic structure, literature and culture. Can also serve as a secondary building block towards a Bachelor of Arts (Cree and Saulteaux).

Certificate in Language Guardianship – 10 courses

This program is for those wishing to become community language warriors in the efforts towards Indigenous language revitalizaiton.

$First\ Nations\ Language\ Instructor\ Certificate-10\ courses$

This program is designed for language instructors, teachers, and teachers' aides working in First Nations classrooms who are already fluent in a First Nations language.

Certificate in Indigenous Environmental Management – 10 courses

In this steppingstone certificate, students will complete foundation courses and will have the option to branch out into other degree programs.

Certificate in Indigenous Management 1 – 5 courses

This program is for those preparing for administrative careers or working in administrative positions.

Certificate Indigenous Management 2 – 10 courses

This program can be the second step for those preparing for administrative careers or working in administrative positions. Students can choose electives that focus on administration in First Nations organizations.

Certificate in Indigenous Economic Development – 6 courses

Engage in culturally appropriate strategies for economic development with Indigenous communities.

Certificate in Hospitality, Tourism and Gaming – 5 courses

This program was developed with leaders and managers in the hospitality, tourism and gaming entertainment industry.

Certificate in Reconciliation Studies – 6 courses

This certificate focuses on efforts to close the gap between First Nations and non-First Nations societies within Canada.

Nonprofit Sector Leadership and Innovation Certificate – 10 courses

This certificate is designed for students who want to work in the nonprofit, community-based sector

Professional Development Certificate Programs




