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Workshop 1

Open Research Practices with Dr. Chris Oriet

Tuesday May 27 at 10 a.m. Via Zoom.

This workshop will introduce you to the Open Science Framework, which allows researchers to easily and transparently share their materials with others. We'll discuss some of the benefits of doing research in an open and transparent way, with an eye to both ethical and practical considerations.



Workshop 2

Literature Reviews & Library Tools *** with Cara Bradley

Tuesday June 10 at 10:30 a.m. CK185 In-Person/Hybrid.

As a student researcher, placing your work within existing research is essential. In this session with librarian Cara Bradley, you'll learn how to choose the right type of literature review, search effectively, and organize your findings to save time and reduce stress.

Dr. Chris Oriet

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A Professor in the Department of Psychology and an Associate Dean in the FGSR, Chris completed his PhD at the University of Waterloo and an NSERC/Killam Postdoctoral Fellowship at the University of British Columbia before joining the University of Regina. Current research interests include face familiarization, the role of context in face recognition, attentional capture, and visual search.



Cara Bradley

Cara Bradley is the Research & Scholarship Librarian at the UR, supporting graduate students and faculty in their research. An active scholar herself, she has published and presented widely on information literacy, scholarly communication, and teaching and learning.







Workshop 3

Poster Skills & Visual Knowledge Mobilization with Dr. Omar El-Halfawy

Thursday June 26 at 10 a.m. CK 187 In-Person.

In this session, students will learn about: the general roles of posters in academic communications; the similarity and difference between posters and other ways of communications including oral presentations and journal papers; how to convey the points effectively – the what-why-how-what-what approach; how to draw the attention of the audience; and some suggestions about the layout, graphic-text balance, captions, font sizes, etc.



Workshop 4

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Indigenous Research Methodologies with Dr. Sherry Farrell-Racette

Tuesday July 8 at 10 a.m. ED 388 In-Person.

This session explores Indigenous research methodologies grounded in the principle of "Nothing About Us Without Us." Participants will learn about relationality, respect, and reciprocity when working with Indigenous communities, and how to approach research with Indigenous Peoples rather than on them. A mustattend for students pursuing community-engaged or ethicallyinformed research.

Dr. Omar El-Halfawy

As a Canada Research Chair in Chemogenomics and Antimicrobial Research and an Assistant Professor of Biochemistry at the UR, Omar's interdisciplinary lab explores antibiotic resistance, microbial virulence, and new antimicrobial strategies. He holds a B.Sc. and M.Sc. from Alexandria University, a Ph.D. from the University of of Western Ontario, and completed post-doctoral training at McMaster University's Institute for Infectious Diseases Research.



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Dr. Sherry Farrell-Racette

Sherry is an interdisciplinary scholar, artist, and curator whose work is grounded in storytelling. Her work with archives and museum collections has a strong emphasis on retrieving women's voices and recovering knowledge. Most recently, she was crossappointed to Native Studies and Women's and Gender Studies at the University of Manitoba. She remains deeply committed to experiential learning and Indigenous pedagogies.





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Workshop 5

Research and Al with Dr. Justin Longo

Tuesday July 22 at 10 a.m. Via Zoom.

Explore how artificial intelligence is transforming the research landscape from literature reviews to data analysis. This session covers the benefits and risks of AI tools, academic integrity, responsible use, bias, and the evolving role of AI in interdisciplinary research.

Krista is a research communications strategist at the UR where she helps researchers share their work in clear and compelling ways. With a background in storytelling, journalism, and public engagement, Krista specializes in translating complex ideas into plain language to connect with a wide range of audiences. Krista has helped shape communications strategies for major research initiatives and regularly collaborates with faculty and students to bring research to life through writing, various media, and public talks.





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Presentation & Feedback Session

Tuesday August 26 from 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. ED 191 & ED 193 In-Person.

- 3-5 minute presentation

Participants are invited to showcase their research projects through digital posters and 3–5 minute presentations. This session is an opportunity to share what you've learned, receive constructive feedback from judges, and engage in discussion through Q&A. Be prepared to present your work and answer questions about your research in a supportive and encouraging environment. Prizes will be awarded for outstanding presentations.

Cash prizes of:

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\$500, \$300, \$200 for the top 3 for best undergrad presentation
\$500, \$300, \$200 for the top 3 for best graduate presentation
Plus prizes for the second and third place presentations for
both undergrad and graduate research students who have
attended a minimum of 3 workshops.

Students participating in this feedback session will have their posters printed free of charge to be (1) used during the Student Research Showcase (SRS) and

(2) following the SRS, theirs to keep for future use.

Unable to attend? You can still receive feedback on your poster and presentation by submitting a video, but you will not be eligible for prizes.



Student Research Showcase (SRS)

Part of Research Week - tentatively October 27-31, 2025



Hosted during Research Week, the **Student Research Showcase** is your opportunity to present your work to the broader campus and community.

Graduate students can participate in the 5-Minute Research Presentation Challenge, where you'll practice clearly and confidently communicating your research to a non-specialist audience.

Undergraduate and graduate students can also enter the Poster Competition, presenting their work visually and engaging with judges, faculty, peers, and industry guests.

- Open to all student researchers who conducted research over the summer
- Prizes awarded for top presentations
- Great for professional development, networking, and CV-building

Participation is optional but strongly encouraged for **SRI participants**—it's the perfect way to apply what you've learned and showcase the impact of your work.
