Biographical Sketch: Elsworth F. Baker was born in 1903 in South Dakota, USA and was a 17 year old student at Regina College during the school year 1920/21, and won first prize in Mathematics that year, he later attended the Regina Normal School. Baker became a psychotherapist who studied and worked with Wilhelm Reich (1897-1957) for 11 years. Reich is credited with the discovery of a biological energy, "orgone energy", the study of which is Orgonomy, and which follows along Freud's idea on the libido. In 1967 Baker founded the *Journal of Orgonomy* and the American College of Orgonomy located in Princeton, New Jersey.

Dr. Baker's publication, *Man in the Trap* was published 18 times during 1957 and 2000, he died in 1985.
