Biographical Sketch: Paul Gingrich was born on March 7, 1942 in Chatham, Ontario. He obtained a Bachelor of Arts (Hons) in Mathematics from the University of Western Ontario in 1964 and a Masters of Arts in Economics from the University of Toronto in 1966. From 1966 to 1971 he attended the University of Michigan, studying in the Department of Economics.

Paul's first teaching experience was as a summer instructor at Frontier College in 1964. From 1966 to 1969 he was a research assistant in the Population Studies Center at the University of Michigan and in 1967 spent the summer at The Population Council in New York City. He taught Economics as a Teaching Assistant at the University of Michigan and as a sessional instructor at Henry Ford Community College from 1969 to 1971. In 1971-72 he was assistant professor in the Department of Economics at the College of Business Administration at Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana. Later in 1972 he joined the Department of Sociology and Social Studies at the University of Regina, attaining the rank of Professor in 1992, and retiring in 2007.

Paul taught many courses at the University of Regina including: Introduction to Social Theory (Sociology 250); Statistics for the Social Sciences (Social Studies 201); Social Issues (Sociology 204); Contemporary Social Theories (Sociology 319); Multiculturalism (Sociology 211); Contemporary Social Theories (Sociology 319); Classical Social Theories (Sociology 318); Issues in Modern Sociological Theory (Sociology 304); Applied Methods: Quantitative Approaches (Social Studies 306); Sociology of Work (Sociology 310); Theories of Social Class and Power (Sociology 308) and Research Methods II - Multivariate Statistics (Sociology 405). His papers and research are on topics such as multiculturalism and people's understanding of it; refugees, immigration and integration; people and community in rural Saskatchewan, family farms and rural survival strategies. He is also interested in population and labour force issues such as incomes of young people and families.

Paul's Administrative duties include membership in the University of Regina Executive of Council as well as the Research Ethics Board. He has been the Acting Executive Director of the University of Regina Faculty Association, as well as Chair of the Grievance Committee and a member of the Executive and Internal Management Committees of the Association. For the Department of Sociology and Social Studies, Paul has been on thirteen Honours and thirty Graduate Committee, external examiner for five Master of Arts oral exams, a member of the Department's Student Research Fund, and has been responsible for Library ordering. In the Regina community Paul was a member of the board of the Regina Open Door Society and has been a contributor to the media on social and economic issues.

He is a member of the Prairie Metropolis Centre. He has authored or co-authored numerous papers and articles. His membership in Professional Organizations include the Canadian Population Society and the Canadian Sociological Association. He has given many public talks on population and economics; he is now Professor Emeritus, University of Regina.
