CUSC 2020 - 2017 Middle-Years Student Survey

CUSC Background

The 2020 *Middle-Years Student Survey* marks the 26th cooperative study undertaken by the *Canadian University Survey Consortium / Consortium canadien de recherche sur les étudiants universitaires* (CUSC/CCREU) and the 21st study in which the University of Regina has participated. The 2020 survey involved 29 universities and over 20,000 middle-years university students from across Canada.

The survey was sent to 3,000 University of Regina students (including those in the Federated Colleges). Middle-years students are those who have earned between 25 and 101 credits. A total of 1,158 students completed the survey.

Recommend university to others

Students were asked to rate if they would recommend their university on a scale from 0 (not at all likely) to 10 (extremely likely). Using the Net Promoter Score calculation, where detractors (rating of 0 to 6) are subtracted from promoters (rating of 9 or 10), participating universities across Canada have a score of -1 (27% promoters minus 28% detractors). The University of Regina has a score of -33 (16% promoters minus 49% detractors).
