ACADEMIC UNIT REVIEW SELF STUDY REPORT

REVIEW YEAR 2023-2024



1. BACKGROUND

Following a review of the Language Institute in 2002, the then Senior Administration recommended that a department of modern languages be created in the Faculty of Arts. Language Institute members, teaching Japanese, Mandarin, Russian, Spanish and German, became members of the Department of International Languages, and undertook to create viable academic degree programs in most disciplines. This new academic unit developed in accordance with the University of Regina's guiding principles for future growth ("Shaping Our Future", 1999), aimed at the integration of an international perspective into the threefold mission of instruction, research and service. Strategies for this included the facilitation of exchanges with other universities, the expansion of curricula to include broader perspectives, and the pursuit of research in collaboration with colleagues in other countries. In short, to increase student and faculty mobility as well as to seek out service opportunities where their expertise was relevant in developing countries. Programming was designed to prepare students to be adaptable in increasingly global career settings by providing them with practical foreign-language communication skills and experiential learning, a broader outlook, and greater sensitivity to other cultures and diversity.

By 2007, the Department faculty complement had grown to nine, and BA degree- and minorprograms in German, Chinese, Japanese and Spanish were available to students, while Russian was discontinued. As part of this growth, it was necessary to create a good number of intermediate and advanced language-and-culture courses to constitute an academic program and to prepare students to participate in exchange programs abroad. As interest has arisen the Department has offered language courses in other areas, including Korean and Arabic. A decline in enrolments prompted calls from the Arts Budget Advisory Committee for a Program review in 2018, which led to the discontinuation of all language degree- and minor- offerings. As part of this process, the Department was encouraged to, and has developed, certificate programming in each language area (e.g., Certificate of German language and culture) to replace the BA and minors. Moreover, International Languages' course offerings at the 100- and in some cases 200- level provide students with pathways to meet the various requirements of a student's additional language learning as part of an Arts degree program. With nearly all students of the degree and minor- programming now completed, the Department currently offers four Certificates in language and culture, doing so with a complement of four faculty, sessional instructors, and an external Head. On account of two retirements in 2022, the Department presently has no faculty in the area of Spanish, which is problematic for students wanting to complete the Certificate in Spanish and Hispanic culture.

Over the past 15 years, Department members have served the faculty and the University committee via numerous roles, as well as, having contributed to three administrative areas. Course releases have been provided for the development of on-line courses, through funding from the Distance and Distributed Learning Committee. While this by no means exhaustive list of contributions to



University- and Faculty-level administration reflects well on the organisational and leadership qualities of departmental faculty; the corresponding course releases have necessitated that the Department rely on sessional support for the delivery of our undergraduate program. Two longstanding sessional instructors, Yuki Kishimoto and Ricardo Arisnabarretta, have been particularly important in this regard.

3. RESEARCH SPECIALISATION AND SCHOLARLY OUTPUT/RECENT PUBLICATIONS

The Department has three senior instructors and a single faculty member in the professorial rank. Research is not a requirement of instructors, who devote their efforts to the delivery of six or more undergraduate courses per academic year. This is not to say, their scholarship is of lesser importance. Indeed, our instructors have been at the forefront of teaching pedagogy and in the development of on-line course offerings that foster experiential learning. For example, Tomoko Lamb used the opportunities provided on a sabbatical to develop on-line versions of her Japanese 100-level courses with competitive funding from Distance and Distributed Learning Committee (DDLC). Dr. Zimmermann has similarly garnered DDLC funding this year to develop on-line courses (GER111 and GER112) as part of a sabbatical planned for 2025. In an earlier sabbatical he created both translation courses and a study abroad class (GER396AA, Berlin: Narratives of a City) for students of German that was also offered to students in the Geography and Environmental Studies degree. Lily Wang has been a regular invited speaker relating to the teaching of Chinese as a second language (e.g. Wang, Li. A new exploration on the teaching mode of "double class confluence" in literature course, 21st International Teaching Chinese as a Second Language Conference. Canadian TCSL Association, 2022). A brief description of the research interests of our professorial faculty and examples of their recent publications are presented below.

Dr. Blachford's research interests cover the areas of China studies, language education, international business education, race relations and ethnic policies, and internationalization in higher education.

4. Community Service Initiatives

The Department has historically maintained a close relationship with a variety of local/provincial, national and international communities and organisations since its inception. Such relationships foster and support language learning throughout the community and provide a link to the cultural identity of first and subsequent generations of newcomers to Canada. Some examples are:

Tomoko Lamb has served in an executive role for the Regina Japanese Club, Fujioka city exchange program for the public and separate school boards, and the Japanese community heritage school. Presently she is contact person for the Japanese Consulate General in Calgary when they visit Regina, and has been an ambassador during recent visits of a director of The Japan Foundation Toronto and a Japanese teaching advisor relating to the situation of Japanese language education.

Dr. Michael Zimmermann is a member the Canadian Association of University Teachers of German (German Studies Canada) and has served as Vice-President of both the Saskatchewan German Council and the Association of Translators and Interpreters of Saskatchewan. He also serves the community in his capacity as a nationally certified German-English translator.

Dr. Dongyang Blachford was an invited keynote speaker for: "China's Relationship with Saskatchewan-Education, trade and Culture" by University of Saskatchewan, City of Saskatoon and Diefenbaker Canada Center, April 23, 2019.

As well as being a lead panellist at the Chinese Teachers' training workshop and multicultural conversational partners program, Lily Wang served on the UofR Confucius Institute Advisory committee for URInternational (2019-22). She Chairs the Membership Committee for the Board of Directors of the Canadian Teaching Chinese as a Second Language Association. In the local community, Lily is active in the Regina Chinese Canadian Association.

Our sessional instructors also play a role in outreach activities for the communities we serve, especially with respect to new immigrants and their language training. Ricardo Arisnabarreta serves as the board of the Canadian Centre for Language Benchmarks from 2022. Whilst, Yuki Kishimoto has served on the executive of the Canadian Association for Japanese Language Education member and actively involved in Regina Hibiki Taiko, a Japanese style drumming group from 2017.



5. PROGRAMS OFFERED

5.1. Programs

Introduction

The Department of International Languages offers programs at the Undergraduate level in Chinese, German, Japanese, and Spanish. As listed in the 2023-24 Undergraduate Calendar (pp. 127-128, see Appendix 2), these are: the Certificate in Chinese Language and Culture, the Certificate in German Language and Culture, the Certificate in Japanese Language and Culture, Certificate in Spanish Language and Hispanic Cultures. Discussions are on-going for a new Certificate in International (or Global) Languages and Cultures, that might replace one or more of the above, or that could guide students into one of the above programs, should they find learning one or more languages attractive. Prior to the 2018 review to discontinue, we offered BA degree, major and minor programs in all of the four language areas (see Appendices 3-4). Admissions to the BA in German, minor in German, and certificate in German were suspended effective January 1, 2020. Suspension for admissions to the BA in Spanish, the minor in Spanish and a Certificate in Spanish, and the BA in Chinese, the minor in Chinese and a Certificate in Chinese followed effective January 1, 2021, and to the BA in Japanese, minor in Japanese, and certificate in Japanese effective January 1, 2022. Given our degree programs were offered until very recently and some students are still working their way towards degree completion, it is important to note that students could combine their academic studies with career-related work placements, enabling those students to integrate academic theory with practice in their field, by participating in the university's Co-operative education program. Prior to the pandemic the Department had several options for students to study and obtain program credit abroad; we are exploring options with URInternational to restart these opportunities for experiential learning. Program advising is currently conducted by Arts Student Services and in the Department by the Head, with informal advising conducted by faculty.

Admission

No prior knowledge of a language is needed for program entry. Students with prior experience in a language (study, family background) should consult the Department to determine appropriate course placement prior to registering in courses in that language. Please see Appendix 2 for more information on our undergraduate programs as per the University Calendar.

5.2. Service teaching in support of other programs

The Bachelor of Arts (BA) is a four-year, 120-credit-hour degree consisting of a set of core requirements (designed to achieve breadth), one or two majors (to achieve depth), and electives (free choices). Minors are optional. Students are allowed to count a maximum of 48 credit hours of 100-level courses towards their program. The Department of International Languages offers courses in Chinese, German, Japanese and Spanish to help students fulfil the core additional language requirement (6 credit hours) for this degree; students may elect to take any two courses from the same language other than English. Further, the BA/BA Honours in International Studies is a 120-



credit-hour degree program that has the same core requirement to the BA degree; however, students must take four (12-credit hour) courses in the same language other than English (e.g., China 111, 112, 211 and 212, or others). The Faculty of Arts Liberal Arts Diploma has a 6-credit-hour additional language requirement identical to the BA degree. Further details to these programs and their language requirements are given in Appendix 4. In addition to the above, at times the Department has offered courses to support the degree programs of other units in Arts. For example, Dr. Blachford is presently teaching CHIN290AD – contemporary China, a new course cross-listed in the History BA program as HIST290AV – China since Mao. This course attracted 27 (9 and 18, respectively) students for the winter 2024 semester, and has to potential to be offered each year.

5.3. Enrolment trends

With the discontinuation of our four BA major, minor and original certificate language programs over the period 2020-22, a ten-year review of enrolment trends has these chiefly reflecting students' completion of these various programs. The available statistical data for our new Certificate programs for Chinese, German, Japanese and Spanish is scant, and it is early days to make definitive statements concerning their popularity. The data make clear to us, however, that many of our students do not declare their desire to take the Certificate until near completion. In term of general class enrolment in our language areas, no doubt the arrival of the pandemic has caused additional uncertainty to such data. In an examination of the class enrolments for 2018-19 through 2022-23, Spanish, Japanese and German program courses remain strong at the 100-level. The China program courses have consistent, but low enrolments at the 100-level, but 300-level courses have been attractive. These upper level translation courses are important, and serve a population of the University, almost exclusively native speakers of Chinese, a group that may not complete the certificate. The unforeseen retirement of both faculty members teaching Spanish in 2022 has impacted our ability to offer core courses (200-level) for both the Certificate in Spanish Language and Hispanic Culture, and for those we deliver to various degree programs, particularly in student fulfilment of the additional language requirements of the BA/BA Honours degrees in International Studies. For this reason, students who had planned to take this Certificate are in limbo (and may have chosen to drop). Some influence on our enrolment may also reflect the current political climate that has seen negativity in the media towards China, such that Chinese courses are perhaps less popular with students. It should be noted, that while the Spanish, Japanese and Chinese programs all employed sessionals in meeting their teaching needs, a single instructor has taught all of the scheduled German program courses. Given that, at times, the instructor taught more than a regular load in a particular semester or year, such teaching has been recorded to provide teaching credit at a later date. Details of our enrolment, as prepared by the Office of Institutional Research for the period 2014-2023, are provided in Appendix 5.

6. UNIT BUDGET

The Department of International Languages currently has four full-time faculty members, and an external Head. Three members (Instructors) have a typical teaching load of 6-courses, and one member (Professor) has a 4-course load. Requests for sessional stipends are made each year based on student demand, program and course requirements, and full-time staff complements and expected leaves.

Up until last fall, the Department had a budget allocation for Teaching Assistants and Student Support of \$12,500 per year. Changes to how these funds are distributed across the Arts Faculty mean that our budget going forward is nil. The Department's discretionary budget for all other expenditures is \$12,500. This discretionary budget is also enhanced by the receipt of Centre for Continuing Education (CCE) revenues for Faculty taught courses the Department offers through CCE; those funds have in the past been used to establish and fund scholarships and awards, speaker visits, and other special initiatives.

The following Table shows spending by broad category for 2018-2023. Campus wide budget cuts in 2022 had the Faculty of Arts claw back \$26,321 from the Department. Note that this table does not include sessional expenditures covered by CCE, nor the salary of the external Head.

7. SWOT ANALYSIS (STRENGTHS, WEAKNESSES, OPPORTUNITIES, THREATS)

Within the context of Department's roles as part of a comprehensive university we outline below unit strengths, weakness, opportunities and threats.

Strengths

International Languages has up to recently focused on having a fair distribution of faculty that can offer a coherent undergraduate program while also maintaining a modest level of active research. Our international faculty are senior and bring to their students and scholarship a breadth of experience in global languages and cultures, across each of the four areas. At the same time, our young, engaging sessionals convey energy and enthusiasm that is positive for enrolment; these contract staff are committed to the Department in wanting to become permanent faculty. Collegiality, both at the Department level and across the campus, means International Languages is a positive environment in which to work. We are a small department, which fosters a friendly, familiar, and inclusive environment for all. Small class sizes are better for learning a language, and students are less afraid to practice their speaking skills in such a supporting environment; in doing so they gain social interaction skills and those relating to public speaking, each valuable in society and looked upon favourably by employers.

Our students welcome and embrace study abroad opportunities (experiential learning) as part of their language learning. A testament to our faculty is that we have built and fostered relationships with overseas institutions where our students can improve their language acquisition, whilst being immersed in a new culture. Such opportunities for *Discovery* help frame our commitment to the University's strategic plan.

A Faculty of Arts degree program review in 2022 demonstrated a commitment to language learning, in maintaining an additional language *core requirement* to the BA degree (students are to take a minimum of two 100-level classes in the same language other than English). It is unlikely further changes will be made in the near-term, such that our programing at the 100-level is secure. Moreover, advances in technology and instructional resources, that we became adept with during the pandemic, have made a language lab available to anyone with a computer or smart phone. As such, we reap the benefit as students can reinforce their language practice at a time/place of their choosing. New on-line course offerings by the Department also now reach a global market.

Opportunities

A need for school teachers with additional language skills has been identified, both nationally and abroad. After a period of austerity and a 'hiring chill' the Faculty of Arts and University are looking to build, with possibilities for new faculty – we have engaged with the Arts Faculty to request positions to cover Spanish. A growing international student population, as well as, children of recent immigrants to Regina now graduating from local schools has the potential for building enrolment in our various language courses. Recognising many of these students are fluent in more than one language, have little fear of learning an additional language, we could find opportunities to offer other languages in addition to Japanese, Chinese, German and Spanish. In this regard, we hope to explore the possibility of offering courses in American Sign Language (ASL), and in doing so focus on the *Well-being and Belonging* vision of the University.



Weaknesses

The Academic Program Review, initiated because of low enrolment in our various BA programs, led to the creation of new certificates in each language area. These certificates sought to shorten the time needed for completion to about two years. Despite addressing concerns by creating a more manageable certificate, student interest has not increased as much as hoped, in part because it has been undermined by course cancellations (see Class-size minima, below). While our programing shows a commitment to a liberal arts education within a comprehensive university, a switch to activity-based budgeting, tied strictly to enrolment might make it difficult to argue for new or replacement faculty positions. For example, the small class sizes ideal for teaching language could be interpreted as a weakness, with new positions distributed to other areas where enrolment has shown growth.

With presently just one faculty in the professorial ranks, it is not possible to create a research cluster, and thus challenging to support their research. To counter this negative, our faculty engage in cross-disciplinary scholarship both within and external to our faculty (e.g. co-supervision with graduate student in the Faculty of Education).

Threats

Many of our regular faculty plan to retire within the next ten years, some in the next five. Given retirement of both Spanish faculty in 2022 and no agreed replacement, this places problems for the viability of our program offerings. Students presently have no pathway to complete their Certificate in Spanish language and Hispanic culture. As a consequence of this, the Dean of Arts has requested a discontinuation review of this Certificate.

Not limited to just Canada, additional languages are no longer being regularly taught in school. One reason is changes to curricula (no longer a requirement in school to graduate), another is the lack of qualified teachers to do so. This perhaps puts domestic students at a disadvantage when compared to their international peers who commonly may speak two or more languages, fluently. Further, a lack of language exposure (in part due to our geographic position) has many students with a negative view of courses they perceive as difficult. Overcoming such perceptions is a challenge, but through our relationships built on outreach and in the training of future teachers, we hope to turn this negative into an opportunity for growth. Resilience lies in our relationships, and with an ever-more interconnected world, together we are stronger.

Class-size minima. Both the Centre for Continuing Education (CCE) and Arts regularly cancel language classes offered by the Department, often at last minute, leaving little options for students, and creating a negative view for the Department as a result. Students have found it difficult to complete their Certificate programs in a reasonable time. An increasing number of language courses are now being offered on campus, which has taken a bite out of our enrolment (e.g., indigenous languages), compounding issues relating to these class minima.

Political sensitivities. We recently had to cancel our 2024 study abroad tour to Beijing-China, because the overseas institution was placed on a Federal government list of institutions we could no longer partner with. Such last minute actions lead to negative consequences for our students (17 in this case) in completing their programs and to their, and our external partner's, view of the Department, despite this being beyond our control.

SUMMARY OF ACADEMIC and ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIVITIES

Teaching and Supervision

My principal teaching responsibilities are in the fields of Mineralogy, Petrology and Volcanology. I presently teach Earth and Environment (Geol 102), an introductory course in environmental geoscience, Mineralogy (I & II; Geol 210/211), which includes systematic mineralogy, crystallography and optical mineralogy, Igneous Petrology (Geol 313), Metamorphic Petrology (Geol 315), and advanced (400/800 level) courses in Mineralogy, Volcanology and Analytical Methods, focussing on electron microscopy. I have also given courses at various levels in Environmental Geology, Physical Geology, Geochemistry / Geochronology, and Field Geology / Field Mapping. I am the coordinator for the Departmental Geoscience seminar series (Geol 900), and since 2011 I have been the academic coordinator for the Geology Co-operative education programme.

Teaching Philosophy - I have an infectious and positive enthusiasm for teaching and education. I believe that an exemplary university education includes students being taught not only subject specific skills, but subject transferable skills which will be of benefit in their further academic and working lives. I feel it important that students gain a conceptual grasp of the subject area, rather than just simply assimilation of facts, and this is imparted into my teaching style. In my experiences, I have seen that enhancing student engagement in the learning process is key, especially as people learn in a variety of ways and not all at the same pace; students learn best when

they are engaged in active inquiry. I do this by making geological concepts and Earth materials relevant and linking these to current affairs and real world examples (e.g., natural hazards), as well as in searching for new ways to fostering student experiential learning. To this end my teaching is focused as much towards student led learning as traditional directed learning, wherever possible incorporating my research and that of my research team or colleagues into the classroom. It is also presented in many different dynamic and stimulating teaching environments, utilising a variety of media and instructional materials both face to face and at a distance.

General Information

Two degree programs are offered: the Bachelor of Arts (BA) in Journalism and the Bachelor of Journalism (BJ). The BA in Journalism is a four-year, 120-credit hour degree consisting of two stages: two years of pre-journalism in the Faculty of Arts and a two year program in the School of Journalism. The BJ is a two-year, 60credit hour degree designed for students with a previous degree who seek a specialization in journalism. (Please note: First year BJ is the pre- qualifying program that degree-holding students who do not have a prior journalism degree or experience are required to take in preparation for entering the MJ program.

The School provides broadly-based courses in print-online, radio, and television journalism. Digital radio and television studios, cameras, editing, and mixing equipment are available to students. The School offers desktop publishing and internet facilities for the dissemination of student-produced stories. Students will critically analyze journalistic practice as well as produce stories for print and online newspapers, magazines, and radio and television newscasts.

Bachelor of Arts (BA) Overview

The BA is a four-year, 120-credit-hour degree consisting of a set of core requirements (designed to achieve breadth), one or two majors (to achieve depth), and electives (free choices). Minors are optional. Students are allowed to count a maximum of 48 credit hours of 100-level courses towards their program.

Students who, as part of their admission to the Faculty of Arts, had to complete an English Language Proficiency test or who completed ESL 050 at the University of Regina or those who already write another language are exempt from this requirement. Previous knowledge in a language other than English requires a pre-registration assessment. Contact the Arts Student Services Office or the Department of International Languages for further information.

Major (36-72 credit hours)

The Faculty of Arts offers majors as listed in the Academic Programs in Arts table.

Majors require between 36 and 72 credit hours (12- 24 courses), with at least nine credit hours at the 300- or 400-level. Departments may also specify up to 15 credit hours in courses in related ("cognate") subjects. Combined majors have a minimum of 60 credit hours (20 courses).

Students can choose to do two majors. The second major can be in another subject offered by the Faculty of Arts, or in a subject offered by either the Faculty of Media, Art, and Performance or the Faculty of Science, or La Cité.

Individual Major

If concentration in one subject area does not completely fulfill the pursuit of a specific goal, students have the option of pursuing an individualized interdisciplinary major. Students have the flexibility to create major involving courses from several different subject areas which share a common theme. Individual majors have been pursued in topics such as Canadian studies, cognitive science, development studies, and social sciences. Students who want to pursue the interdisciplinary study of a different theme should consult the Arts Student Services Office (or, for students registered in a Federated College, their College's Academic or Registrar's Office) for information about individual majors.

Minor (optional) (18 - 24 credit hours)

Available minors are listed in Academic Programs in Arts table. Students may declare up to two minors.

Arts students are permitted to complete a minor in Media, Art, and Performance, Kinesiology, Science or La Cité (refer to the respective faculty's section for minor requirements).

Electives

Degree-credit courses offered by this University can be counted towards a student's program as an elective. Refer to Elective Courses for regulations governing elective courses. Students are encouraged to consult an advisor in the department offering their major for help in constructing a well-rounded program.

A maximum of 60 credit hours of courses outside the Faculties of Arts, Media, Art, and Performance; Science, or La Cité may be counted towards a BA program.

Bachelor of Arts Honours Overview (BA Hons)

A BA Honours program is one that allows more specialization than is possible in the BA. It is designed for students who wish a deeper insight and more intensive training in their subject of special interest and who can meet the higher standards set. Students interested in entering an honours program should consult the head of the department concerned as early as possible in their academic programs, so that the program of studies may be planned in conformity with the requirements of the proposed honours program.

Requirements

The BA Honours program consists of a minimum of 120 credit hours and must include the following:

- 1. All of the BA core requirements.
- A requirement of 51 to 66 credit hours in the major as determined by each department, including a minimum of 12 credit hours at the 400 level in not fewer than 3 courses. Students should consult with the department concerned for specific requirements.
- An honours paper, a program of honours courses, and/or a comprehensive oral or written examination. Students should consult with the department concerned for specific requirements.
- 4. A maximum of 48 credit hours of introductory courses are allowed towards the program.

Application Procedures for Honours Programs

Requirements for admission to Honours programs are outlined in the Table of Admission and Residency Requirements. There is a formal application procedure for the Honours programs; application forms are available from the Arts Student Services Office and College Registrar's Offices or on the web at: <u>https://www.uregina.ca/arts/student-resources/choosing-program/honours-programs.html</u>. Students can apply in the term in which they will complete the minimum requirements for their major as identified in the Table of Admission and Residency Requirements.

Advanced Certificate in Arts

The Advanced Certificate in Arts provides the equivalent of a four-year BA degree to holders of a three-year BA from the University of Regina or another approved university. The Advanced Certificate in Arts may be in a major different than that of the underlying BA program.

Students must complete at least 30 credit hours in addition to the courses in the three-year BA, including any remaining requirements of their chosen major. Students whose BA is from another university must complete at least 15 credit hours in the major subject as part of the certificate.

Each student's program must be approved by the head of the department offering the major. The certificate requires the same graduating GPAs (calculated on the aggregate of degree, diploma, and certificate courses) as the BA degree.

Bachelor of Arts Honours Certificate

The BA Honours Certificate provides the equivalent of a four-year Honours degree to holders of a three-year BA or a four-year bachelor's degree from the University of Regina or another approved university. The Honours Certificate may be in a major different than that of the underlying degree program.

Students must complete at least 30 credit hours in addition to the courses in the bachelor's degree, including any remaining requirements of the BA Honours in (and any remaining core requirements if their previous degree is not a BA from the University of Regina), and must meet the residency requirements. The BA Honours Certificate is governed by the same regulations, has the same admission criteria and procedure, and requires the same graduating GPAs (calculated on the aggregate of degree, diploma, and certificate courses) as the BA Honours degree.

Articulation Agreements

Bachelor of Health Studies Articulating from a Saskatchewan Polytechnic Dental Hygiene Diploma

Completion of the Saskatchewan Polytechnic Dental Hygiene Program with a minimum Saskatchewan Polytechnic average of at least 60.00%, with no grade lower than 60.00% in each course is required for admission to this program. Students may apply into the Faculty of Arts (including Campion and Luther Colleges), the Faculty of Kinesiology and Health Studies at the University of Regina or the First Nations University of Canada. Students will be granted 60 credit hours of block transfer credit as outlined below, for the completion of the Saskatchewan Polytechnic diploma. Students must complete the remaining requirements for the Bachelor of Health Studies through the University of Regina. The Liberal Arts Diploma is available to any student registered at the University of Regina. To be eligible, students must have successfully completed (and/or received transfer credit for) 20 University of Regina courses (60 credit hours). Eligibility further requires that students have:

- Successfully completed (or received transfer credit for) a set of courses capable of satisfying the requirements for any minor defined within the Faculty of Arts portion of the Undergraduate Calendar;
- Taken at the University of Regina at least 50% of the 20 courses used to satisfy the requirements of the diploma;
- Attained a PGPA of at least 60.00% in the 20 courses used to satisfy the requirements of the diploma.

International Studies Program

General Information

The International Studies degree is an interdisciplinary program that aims to provide students with the necessary intellectual tools to study the relationships between the local, regional, international, and global levels on the one hand, and the complex connections and interactions between society, culture, politics, economics, and the environment on the other hand. This blending of international and regional studies is a unique aspect of the International Studies degree not found in other international or area studies programs. The International Studies Degree provides students with skills to understand global processes and structures that connect and affect countries and regions of the world. It also enables students to situate different regions in the broader context of global issues.

BA in International Studies

The BA in International Studies is a 120-credit-hour degree. In addition to the Arts core requirements, students must complete the major requirements which include: (1) the International Studies core requirements; (2) the International Studies language requirements; and (3) either the International Affairs concentration or the International Development concentration. The remaining courses are open electives. As part of their open electives, students should plan to complete the prerequisites for the senior courses they wish to take in their major. A maximum of 48 credit hours of courses at the 100-level is permitted.
