

Rebuilding and Finding Meaning in a Digital Era: How Online Activity Affects Women Experiencing Reproductive Loss, explores how women use online spaces following reproductive loss. Using a qualitative narrative inquiry approach, the research examined how social media and digital communities can support meaning-making, identity reconstruction, and connection during grief. The findings highlighted the complex and purposeful ways women curate online engagement, not only to challenge dominant narratives around loss, but also to reconcile co-existing identities and experiences of motherhood, grief, and resilience.
